



HISTORY



The railway line from Le Puy-en-Velay to Langogne came into service in 1912 to provide a link between the industrial centres of the St Etienne region and those of the Cévennes.

However, since 1981, trains have deserted this route and the rails have been removed to create a pleasant path which attracts walkers, cyclists and mountain bikers.

DESCRIPTION

The starting point of the Greenway (North-South direction) is situated 4 km from Le Puy-en-Velay on the way out of Brives Charensac station (altitude 600 m).

A gentle climb (2%), easy for all, takes you to Solignac-sur Loire (altitude 850m). The path goes through 5 tunnels, all lit up, and a metal-spanned viaduct, 184 m long.
